

















Swinerton has always believed that, as a company and as a corporate family, it has a duty to participate in the betterment of the communities in which it builds. In 2002, The Swinerton Foundation was formed to act as the charitable arm of the company for which all charitable giving would be centralized or guided through. The hope was that this would allow for better utilization and allocation of Swinerton's company resources. In its first full year of operations, The Swinerton Foundation was able to distribute \$160,700 in grants to various non-profits across the country.

Since then, The Swinerton Foundation has consistently increased its capacity to give year after year.

In 2016, the Foundation generated \$499,538 in revenue from various fundraising activities and donations, and \$875,098 in revenue from Swinerton Incorporated and its affiliates. While our fundraising activities have expanded to new geographical locations, we have been able to keep our operating costs low, allowing us to distribute over \$535,000 to more than 120 non-profit organizations.

In the last year, The Swinerton Foundation has made the decision to reclassify as a public charity to give it more flexibility in its grant making and extend its reach from the Swinerton walls to deepen its community connections. The process to reclassify has also provided the Board an opportunity to reassess the mission and purpose of the Foundation and develop policies for better management of the Foundation's activities. We are excited to announce that in 2017, we will be launching our Swinerton Cares program, which will include employee gift matching and Dollars for Doers. By matching employee contributions and rewarding them for their volunteer work, we are able to support employees' personal passions and encourage them to be active community members.

The Board would like to thank all of our donors and volunteers for a successful and impactful year. We are looking forward to this next chapter and the opportunities that lie ahead.



Victims of crime and trauma are often left feeling powerless and alone. The aftermath is not limited to the physical scars—the emotional scars that form can take months, even years, to heal. In Jefferson County, Colorado, there is a non-profit organization dedicated to assisting those who have been victimized. Victim Outreach Incorporated (VOI) was formed to promote the healing of people impacted by all manner of crime and trauma. The organization provides crisis intervention, information about victims' rights, support

experience as a result of their victimization.

It's a mission that R.A. Hazen has been a proud supporter of, volunteering an average of 100 hours per month as a Victim Advocate. R.A. and her volunteer peers take on-call shifts of either 15 hours overnight or 24 hours on the weekends to relieve the full-time staff advocates. Callers range from victims of domestic violence and sexual assault to victims of trauma related to suicides, car accidents, and building fires. R.A is enormously proud of the work that she does on behalf of Victim Outreach. The organization, in turn, has provided R.A. with a new perspective—where she can leave the work behind at the office and focus her attention on helping those in need.

In July of 2016, a raging sand fire broke out in the Santa Clarita Valley, burning more than 38,000 acres. The wildfire caused extensive damage to nearby homes and resulted in mass evacuations across Los Angeles county. The Wildlife Waystation was one of those that had to evacuate, though luckily the facility and the animals were not in harm's way.

It was the fire that was the topic of conversation between Jeff Rausten and Mitch Apodaca, Director of Development for National Geographic. Mitch also serves on the Board of Wildlife Waystation, an animal sanctuary that is home to more than 400 permanent animal residents. As he continued his conversation with Jeff, he mentioned that the Waystation was in the process of designing some building projects at the facility. As a professional in the construction industry, Jeff was immediately intrigued and asked how he could help.

Jeff, along with colleagues, family, and friends, spent an entire Saturday digging and hauling cement to create a new pond for long-time resident alligator snapping turtle, Hoss. The project ended up being more work than the group had bargained for, but in true Swinerton fashion they were able to complete the project successfully. Hoss was very excited to see his new digs!

The project proposed was the construction of a climbing tower to add to their existing challenge course at the school. The teachers didn't have a specific plan; they were hoping to use Swinerton's construction expertise to design, build, and finance the tower. What they got was an entire after-school class dedicated to the construction project through The Swinerton Foundation's Adopt-A-School Program.

Each week, the students meet to discuss plans, design, financing, and constructability. The classes are led by Swinerton volunteers and industry professionals, one of which is Chris Evans. Chris has dedicated numerous hours to fundraising for the project, teaching classes, and working with architects to design the tower. His dedication to serving the community has had a lasting impact on the students—exposing youth to viable construction career options and paving the way for future leaders in the industry.

When a child is diagnosed with a life-threatening condition, it's hard to find hope. The hours spent in hospitals, visiting doctors, and undergoing treatments can dampen one's spirit. The Make-A-Wish (MAW) Foundation aims to bring hope back into these children's lives by granting them a wish.

Swinerton's Sacramento team has been a proud supporter of the Make-A-Wish Northeastern California and Nevada chapter for many years. In April, MAW reached out and asked if the group could help them renovate their existing Wishing Room in Sacramento. The Wishing Room is a magical room where approximately 300 wishes are granted each year. All children in the Sacramento region that are granted a wish through the organization are brought to this room, accompanied by their families, to drop their wish request in a mock wishing well. Once the wish is dropped in the well, the room lights up with special-effects lighting, and music is played to indicate the wish has been granted.

Steve Harless led a team of approximately 12 volunteers to complete the makeover project by installing new roofing elements and final lighting. The dedication, determination, and passion of Steve and the team shined throughout the entire process, making the Wishing Room an even more magical place for the wish children and their families. The MAW staff was so ecstatic with the finished product, they gave the group the "golden key" to open the room and unveil the final product for everyone.

It was an early Saturday morning on September 17 when 65 Swinerton volunteers showed up at Balboa Park in San Diego. Each year, the group registers a team to participate in the Heart Walk—lacing up their shoes in support of the American Heart Association (AHA). The 5k walk is one of the largest events that the AHA hosts nationally, bringing together nearly one million Americans at 305 sites to build healthier lives, free of cardiovascular disease and stroke.

The San Diego group's long history with the organization has made it a signature event for the team. They have dedicated time and resources to help the cause, and their support has only grown stronger over time. This year, the group was able to raise \$40,573 for AHA, making them #5 in funds raised out of over 82 companies that participated. Additionally, Swinerton's own Laura Campion beat out everyone at the walk, crossing the finish line in under 20 minutes. Too focused to be interrupted, when a reporter asked to interview her she simply high–fived him and continued to run!



The surgery went well and his cousin was on the mend—feeling better than he had in a long time. The family decided to celebrate by participating in Donor Network West's Donate Life Run/Walk.

Donor Network West is the third largest federally designated organ procurement organization and one of the largest tissue recovery organizations in the nation. Their annual Donate Life Run/Walk is a way to raise awareness about the cause and to help connect donors with those in need. By December of that first year, John's cousin's condition worsened and he passed away a few days after Christmas. It was an emotional time for the family, but they decided to participate in the event the next year in his cousin's memory. That year they had a huge turnout of friends and family offering their support. Unbeknownst to them, the family whose daughter had donated her liver to John's cousin had also planned to attend. Donor Network West reached out to them and suggested that it would be a good cause to help them through their grief. On that day, the family came looking for John's cousin, only to discover that he had passed away. It was a moment that would forever bond the two families.

John has participated in the walk every year since his cousin's passing. It's his way of remembering the time they had together. It's also a way that he can help raise awareness for the cause so that through death there can still be a chance at life given to those who would not have one otherwise.


Ten years ago, Dustin Blankenship joined the Real Estate Council of Austin (RECA) for their Christmas in October event. The annual event brings together over 100 volunteers to offer support for local community organizations. Support includes donations and in-kind services to improve facilities, and each year a new beneficiary organization is chosen.

Dustin introduced RECA to Swinerton Builders volunteers in Austin and has led the team since then in coordinating efforts to offer their time and expertise for the event. In 2016, Dustin, along with other RECA Development Class members, selected Sammy's House to receive much needed renovations free of charge. Sammy's House is a non-profit agency that provides services for children who are medically fragile and/or developmentally challenged. Volunteers spent the day painting the offices in the front of the facility, along with common spaces and the kitchen. The outdoor spaces received a complete renovation as well, breathing new life to the existing playground.

Dustin and the Swinerton Builders team spent countless hours planning logistics, organizing volunteers, and raising funds for RECA. With their help, the organization was able to raise more than \$200,000 in cash and in-kind contributions for Sammy's House to transform their facility into a more inviting healing and functional space for the children.

The organization provides support for families fighting childhood cancer by helping them with daily responsibilities, allowing them to put their time and focus on their child. They aim to empower parents and siblings to ease their burden and anguish during an incredibly difficult time.

In April, Lauren partnered with Claire's Army to run in the North Face Endurance Challenge. The race was 50 miles through Great Falls Park, Virginia. As the name implies, it was a challenging race, but it was nothing compared to the battle that these children face. It was for them that she crossed the finish line, and it is for them that she continues to go the distance.



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
